

THE NORTH BRANCH AT A GLANCE



WHAT MAKES THE BRANCH

Located on Northern Avenue, the North Branch will be our most central location, situated next to the Boreal School and within close proximity to many neighbourhoods including Senior Residences. Just west of Great Northern Road, the North Branch is conveniently located on bus routes, major road ways, and near shopping centres.

- **3,000 sq. feet for archives** dedicated to preserving our community's history.
- **2 Program Rooms** allowing for more programming and community meeting space.
- **5,000+ sq. feet** of public space for collections, computers, programming, and public use.
- **6 internet computer stations** available to the public.

ABOUT ARCHIVES



WHERE HISTORY CALLS HOME

Local residents need to know that the history of their community is open and available to them and that their history is being cared for and preserved for future generations.

Since its creation in the early 1990's, the Archives have amassed an impressive collection, documenting the history of Sault Ste. Marie and Algoma Region dating back as early as 1822. The largest portion of our collection details the industrial history of our community, which includes the Algoma Steel; Algoma Central Railway; and Abitibi Pulp and Paper collections. A significant portion of our collection highlights influential local individuals such as Francis Clergue who created Algoma Steel and many of the industrial complexes in the city, Dr. Roberta Bondar who was the first Canadian woman in space, and Col. Sydney Penhorwood, a World War I veteran who befriended the King of England. Material from our collection has been included in websites, university theses, magazine publications, and books by amateur and academic researchers across North America.

The newly built branch will have a dedicated space that will allow for the growth of the Archives in a climate controlled facility designed to properly preserve our community's history.
