
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# Our Library



### Land Acknowledgment

The Sault Ste. Marie Public Library is a gathering place where community comes together; to share stories, to explore new ideas and to gain knowledge of the past. It is through this unique position in our community that we support and promote truth and reconciliation with Indigenous peoples.

We acknowledge, with respect, that we are in Robinson-Huron Treaty territory, that the land on which we are gathered is the traditional territory of the Anishinaabe and is known as Bawating. Bawating is the home of Ketegaunseebeee (Garden River) First Nation, Batchewana First Nation, and the Historic Sault Ste. Marie Metis Council.

The Library, and we as individuals, have a deep desire to bring about change in our community and move forward together as diverse and inclusive peoples. We are dedicated to honouring Indigenous history and culture and are committed to moving forward in the spirit of reconciliation and respect.

I continue to be impressed by the resilience of our Library, as an organization, and our community. These have been some of the most difficult years in recent memory, yet despite that here we are, undaunted, moving forward with renewed strength and optimism.

In the first few months of 2022, the Library saw closures, resumption of curbside service, mask mandates, vaccination restrictions, and a total lack of in person programming. Much of the same from previous years. However, things began to change. We reopened our doors, and the doors remained open. Slowly at first, people began to return. Long standing programs were resumed. New ones were offered. We began celebrating again. By the year's end the Library resembled its former self, from before the pandemic.

Even with temporary closures and reduced hours, our Library was able to host several musical and theatrical performances in addition to offering more than 700 programs and activities with an attendance greater than 26,000. All while navigating a year of uncertainty and maintaining the valuable services the public has come to expect from their Library.

Libraries are perhaps one of the most resilient organizations in existence. With histories spanning generations, they have transformed over the centuries, keeping pace with evolving societies, new technologies, and occasional crises. This pandemic in fact is not the first our organization has had

to endure (the first being the Spanish flu in 1918). Established in 1896, the Sault Ste. Marie Public Library has proven its resiliency many times over its long history. When reviewing this report and reflecting on the year 2022, you will observe an organization that not only has been enduring a pandemic, but one that has been flourishing as it emerges from it. May we continue to grow and thrive in the years to come.




## Strategic Planning





#### Indigenous Voices Collection



The Library participated in the Doors Open event, held October 1st which allows members of the public to tour and view historical sites, museums and archive facilities, particularly areas that are generally closed to the public. The attendees were given a tour of the Archive Viewing Room, the Clean Room and the Archive Storage Room to learn about the procedures required to protect and preserve our community's historical documents and artifacts.




